I saw Campion G.G. being carried out at night to battn D/S just out of Ypres, he was wounded on 8th, I heard by a shell, being badly wounded, receiving multiple wounds. Did not hear where he died or was buried.

CAMPION G.G. 1920.

There were 2 brothers Campion, one who was missing about 5 a.m. in the raid in front of Passchendaele, the other, whom I take to be G.G. Campion, was wounded about 7 p.m. by shell, which wounded him between the eyes, broke his arm and his neck was injured. I saw the casualty happen, being about 30 yards away at the time. I helped to pick him up and took him to the 31st.Bn. Regt. Aid Post, where I left him. He was unconscious from the first. I knew both Campions well, the oldest was in XVI Pl. D.C.C. I mean the one who was killed. The other was, I think, just transferred to C.C.C. I clearly recognised Campion at the Aid Post.

He was in D.C. XIII Fltn. I knew him fairly well, he was almost an original man. His number would be somewhere about 1900. He was medium height, and build, dark, about 25. On the 10th Octr we were going up to Celtic Wood, to relieve the front line. On the way up I was about 20 yards behind Campion. I heard he was hit and he passed me being carried down to the Field Amb. on a stretcher. This was during the night. S/B Wilkins of the 10th Battn H.Q. who was up with the Battn about 6 weeks ago, was one of the S/Bs carrying Campion down.

He was in D. Coy, and the 16th. Fltn, I know him well; he was a man about 5 feet 3, dark, clean-shaven, about 23. On the 10th. October we were holding the line at Celtic Wood. I was told that Campion was badly wounded and that he died of his wounds. S/Boerer A. L. Wilkins, 10th. A. A. M. C. H.C. (who I saw about a fortnight ago with the Battalion) told me he helped to bury Campion.

"Died of Wounds 10/10/17"

Re 1920 Pte. G. G. Campion D Coy., 10th Batt., I belonged to the same Company as Pte. Campion on the night of the 10/10/17, he was severely wounded. Three other bearers and myself attended his wounds and brought him out to the R.A.P., belonging to 31st Battalion A.I.F., he was then attended to by the Medical Officer. I asked whether he had a chance of pulling through. The Medical Officer replied "Not the slightest". I then left the R.A.P. and proceeded back to the Company. I was told the following day that Pte Campion died at the R.A.P., if so, he would be buried at Anzac Ridge which would be termed as buried on the field, probably his grave would not be registered. Description of the above, Height about 5' 4"- dark complexion. Any information concerning lads of D Coy., 10th Batt., who have fallen in Action since December 1916 I may be able to furnish you with as I was a Company Stretcher Bearer for 18 months.



1920 Pte. G. G. Campion D Coy 10<sup>th</sup> Battalion

I belonged to the same Company as Pte Campion  
on the night of the 10/10/17 he was severely  
wounded myself and three other Bearers attended  
his wounds and brought him out to the R.A.P.  
belonging to 31<sup>st</sup> Battalion A.T. he was then  
attended to by the M.O. I ask whether he had  
a chance of pulling through the M.O. replied  
not the slightest. I then left the R.A.P.  
and proceeded back to the Company. I was  
told the following day that Pte Campion died  
at the R.A.P. if so he would be buried  
at Arras Ridge which would be termed  
as buried on the field probably his grave would  
not be registered
